#### 2. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Based on the committee's approval, Brian Mohan, Assistant City Manager, advised that each speaker would have three minutes to share their comments after completing the agenda. The speakers participated in the meeting during the presentation of item 5.B.i.

Ms. Elaine expressed her concerns about mailbox theft and a few incidents involving being chased by dogs near her home and while bicycling. She doesn't feel very safe walking in her neighborhood and was wondering if there's a newsletter sent out to residents to keep them informed about safety measures. She also wanted to know what can be done to increase safety, such as adding more lighting or other protective measures.

Brian Mohan, Assistant City Manager, mentioned that there is a USPS webpage on the City's website where residents can learn about what can be done regarding cluster box unit theft. He also mentioned that Director Ms. Elanie is planning to meet with Launa Jimenez, our CFO, and will get in touch with you after the meeting, as her office acts as the liaison between residents and USPS.

Ms. Kelly expressed her concerns about cars speeding down her street. She addressed her concerns with the Transportation Engineering team, requesting a speed hump and the installation of a camera.

Brian Mohan, Assistant City Manager, advised that Sean Kelleher, Assistant City Manager (Development), would address the matter, followed by the Transportation Engineering team and Code Enhancement. Both Departments will contact each other for further discussion.

#### 5. <u>ADVISORY ITEMS</u>

#### 5.A. ANIMAL SHELTER SERVICES AND ACTIVITY REPORT

Steve Fries, the Animal Services Division Manager (ASDM), provided an update on the free microchip program available to City of Moreno Valley residents. There are approximately 200 microchips still available, and the promotion will continue through the month of June 2024. Steve also mentioned that the shelter is currently at full capacity, and most shelters across Orange County are facing similar challenges. The construction of the shelter is still in process; however, it's anticipated to be completed by the end of July. Upon completion, a tour will be scheduled.

#### 5.B.i. FIRE SERVICES STATUS REPORT

Chief Park provided a verbal overview of the Fire Prevention report and quickly touched on the percent increase in Fire Stations 69 and 39 over the last year. The committee did not have any questions.

#### 5.B.ii. <u>FIRE PREVENTION REPORT</u>

Fire Marshal Doug Bloom provided an overview of the Fire Department report. He advised that the department has begun notifying the property owners in preparation for the hazard abatement and anticipated to begin the maintenance process by early June 2024 and complete by July 2024. In addition, the City will also start the abatement process for the city-owned properties.

In addition, the Animal Rescue Coordinator transferred 1 hawk and 2 sparrows to a non-profit wildlife animal rescue organization.

#### **B. Field Services:**

Field Services operates on a 7-day, 24-hour calls for service model based on the level of priority on all calls received. Six full-time Animal Control Officers (ACOs), one full-time and one part-time Animal License Inspectors, reporting to one Field Services Supervisor currently serve the city. ACOs rotate Night Truck assignment in response to high priority calls after hours. During normal business hours, Animal Control Officers respond to routine and high priority service requests.

#### C. Other Activities

"Cinco de Mayo & Mother's Day" Pet Adoption Events:

20 pets found new homes during these adoption events beginning May 7<sup>th</sup> through May 11<sup>th</sup> at the Animal Shelter. Adoption fees, \$50 for dogs and \$25 for cats, included spay-neuter, vaccinations, a HomeAgain microchip, and pet care products for each adopted pet.

#### • FREE HomeAgain Microchips:

Everyday beginning on April 23<sup>rd</sup> and throughout the month of May, a total of 126 Moreno Valley pets received a free HomeAgain microchip. This initiative will continue throughout the month of June 2024.





#### **Moreno Valley Station**

The United States Department of Justice (USDOJ), and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), posts annual crime statistics in the Uniform Crime Report (UCR). 


**Priority 1**: Involved circumstances that pose, or did pose in the immediate past, a clearly defined threat to human life or property and which involve a high level of violence or the potential for serious injury.

**Priority 2**: Involve circumstances of an urgent, but not life-threatening nature. They are generally disturbances with a potential for violence, minor assaults and batteries, etc.

**Priority 3**: Involve circumstances which are neither urgent, nor life threatening.

Priority 4: With the exception of several felonies, most past incidents are considered Priority 4.

#### Investigations Team

The Moreno Valley Station's Investigations and Evidence Bureau serves the city of Moreno Valley, as well as a section of the surrounding unincorporated area of Riverside County. The Investigations Bureau is comprised of one Sheriff's Lieutenant, two Sheriff's Sergeants, and twelve dedicated Investigators assigned to various specialties such as robbery, assaults, sex crimes, child abuse, property crimes. There are also two dedicated Deputies and one Community Service Officer assigned to missing persons, runaway juveniles, domestic violence investigations, and Children Services Division/Adult Protective Service referral investigations.

#### Sex Offenders | Arson Offenders

The Moreno Valley Sheriff Station 290 Registration Unit consists of one Deputy Sheriff and one Community Service Officer. The unit currently has 400 allocated hours per fiscal year for compliance checks of sex/arson registrants. Due to the limited hours assigned to the unit, compliance checks are conducted every other month.

The team's duty is to conduct sex & arson offender (including Parole / Probation offenders) compliance checks, investigate related violations, conduct and manage PC290 sweeps, registration events, and assist investigators and deputies with complex PC290 investigations. In addition, the team is responsible for massage parlor inspections and massage therapist license checks. The team also issues massage & secondhand business operational licenses and conduct stolen property investigations with pawn shops.

#### **Community Behavior Assessment Team**

CBAT is a cooperative agreement between RUHS-Behavioral Health and Riverside Sheriff's Department partnering a Clinical Therapist and Deputy Sheriff to assist with crisis mental health services in response to 911 calls. Services include mental health crisis assessments, attempt to divert those in crisis to the lowest level of necessary care, and link those people to outpatient mental health services in an attempt to reduce recidivism.

## SPECIAL TEAMS



#### RBST | GANG | SET | POP | HOT Teams

The Moreno Valley Station Special Teams consist of RBST, SET/GANG and POP/ HOT Teams. The Robbery and Burglary Suppression Team (RBST) actively investigate all robberies, carjackings, thefts, and burglaries occurring in the jurisdiction of the Moreno Valley Station. The main goal of the Special Enforcement Team (SET) is to enhance quality of life for Moreno Valley residence by investigating violent and gang related crimes and to bring cases to a successful conclusion by identifying, apprehending, interviewing, and arresting suspects. The Problem Oriented Policing (POP) team respond to a variety of calls from citizens of Moreno Valley that may fall outside the normal patrol function. POP deputies conduct proactive investigations into narcotics trafficking, human trafficking, marijuana cultivation and vehicle theft with a nexus to Moreno Valley. The Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) team responds to calls from business owners and citizens regarding transient activity.

#### **Marijuana Cultivation Investigation**

Deputies from the Moreno Valley Sheriff's Special Enforcement Team (SET) launched an investigation into the unlawful growth and distribution of marijuana. On May 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2024, the SET Deputies with assistance from JVS SET, Perris SET, RSO MET, SBSO MET, So Cal Edison, LADWP, Moreno Valley Code, Apple Valley Code, and LAFD.

This effort resulted in search warrants being served across Moreno Valley, Apple Valley, La Habra, and Los Angeles. A total of 6,000 marijuana plants at different growth stages were confiscated and 165 lbs. of processed marijuana was seized. In addition, 5 suspects were taken into custody.

#### **NOTABLE CASES FOR MAY**

#### **Cargo Theft**

The Moreno Valley Sheriff's Station Special Enforcement Team (SET) has conducted an investigation since February 2024 into an organized retail crime and trailer cargo theft ring. On May 9, 2024, around 8:00 p.m., Moreno Valley Sheriff's Station SET deputies served a search warrant on a warehouse located in the 24000 block of Highway 74 in the unincorporated area of Perris, known as Good Hope. Over 160 pallets of stolen merchandise, ranging from food products to industrial-grade tools, were seized during the service of the search warrant. The recovered stolen property was valued at over 1.4 million dollars. A truck driver, 34-year-old Rajdeep Singh of Jurupa Valley, was detained during the service of the search warrant and arrested for possession of heroin and drug paraphernalia. This is an ongoing investigation, and deputies are working to determine Singh's involvement and identifying additional suspects.











#### **Ulta Beauty Thefts**

On May 26, 2024, during an Organized Retail Theft operation, the SET Deputies apprehended theft suspect at Ulta Beauty store located at 16625 Frederick Street in Moreno Valley.

The suspect was identified and linked to multiple Ulta Beauty thefts. Through investigation, the suspect was connected to over \$10,000.00 in stolen merchandise.

### HOMELESS OUTREACH



#### **SPECIAL TEAMS - May**

In May 2024, the MVSS Special Teams conducted a total of 4 Homeless Outreach Quality of Life Operations. The 4 Homeless Outreach Operations resulted in assisting 36 individuals (10 accepting assistance) and 22 arrests (19 misdemeanor and 3 felony arrests).

#### **Quality of Life Operation**

On Tuesday May 07, 2024, the Special Teams conducted a "Homeless Sweep Quality of Life Operation" throughout the City boundaries, alongside city resources which included the following: **Maintenance and Operations, Riverside Sheriff's Department and The Salvation Army.** The teams responded and inspected 6 different locations including CRM's concerned areas. The operation assisted 11 individuals and out of those individuals 5 accepted Salvation Army assistance. A total of 3 individuals were arrested.







On Thursday May 09, 2024, the Special Teams conducted a "Homeless Sweep Quality of Life Operation" throughout the City boundaries. The teams responded and inspected 10 different locations. The operation assisted 4 individuals, with 2 individuals accepting services, 3 individuals were arrested.







On Thursday May 23, 2024, the Special Teams conducted a "Homeless Sweep Quality of Life Operation" throughout the City boundaries. The operation assisted 5 individuals with 2 individuals accepting Salvation Army services. Two individuals were arrested.

#### **Quality of Life Operation**

On Thursday May 30, 2024, the Special Teams conducted a "Homeless Sweep Quality of Life Operation" throughout the City boundaries, alongside city resources which included the following: Riverside County Sheriff's Mounted Enforcement, Riverside Sheriff's Department, The Salvation Army and Riverside Mental Health. We responded and inspected 8 different locations including CRM's concerned areas. The operation assisted 11 individuals and out of those individuals, 1 accepted Salvation Army services. A total of 2 individuals were arrested.

















### TRAFFIC TEAM



#### **Moreno Valley Station**

The Moreno Valley Station Traffic Bureau is subdivided into three teams, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement, Accident Investigations and Motor Traffic Enforcement, who collectively maintain safety for drivers on the roadways of Moreno Valley through enforcement, education and engineering. Deputies and Community Service Officers assigned to Accident Investigations are responsible for investigating traffic collisions, which include property damage only collisions, minor-injury traffic collisions, major-injury traffic collisions, fatal traffic collision, hit-and-run collisions, and then taking appropriate enforcement actions based on the outcome of each investigation. The Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Team's responsibilities include conducting commercial vehicle compliance checks (state, federal and international laws), enforcing applicable commercial vehicle laws and municipal codes, perform roadside safety compliance checkpoints and working with allied agencies to help maintain roadway safety regionally. The Motor Enforcement Team maintains safety on the roadways within the jurisdiction of Moreno Valley through the enforcement of those violations identified as primary collision factors and by providing education to the motoring public. Collectively, the Traffic Bureau conduct school zone traffic enforcement, DUI enforcement saturation patrols, distracted driver enforcement, pedestrian safety enforcement, street racing enforcement, while also working to eliminate issues negatively affecting the quality of life for the citizens of Moreno Valley. Additionally, the Moreno Valley Traffic Bureau conducts presentations and training for the citizens of Moreno Valley to provide education in efforts to improve safety on city roadways and actively collaborates with City of Moreno Valley traffic engineers to identify traffic safety concerns throughout Moreno Valley and develop solutions.

#### Notable Cases for May

- On May 29, 2024, Deputies received a FLOCK of a homicide suspect and located the vehicle. As the deputy attempted a traffic stop, the suspect fled, and a pursuit ensued. The pursuit traversed multiple cities until the suspect collided into another vehicle where the suspect was taken into custody without incident
- On May 13, 2024, Deputies responded to the front lobby of the station for damage to the outside emergency telephone that was damaged. Deputies utilized Citywide cameras to track the suspect and were able to locate the suspect and take him into custody.







#### **COMMUNITY SERVICE UNIT**

The Moreno Valley Community Services Unit (CSU) operates under the Station Administration and administers numerous proactive programs designed to educate the public and reduce crime. The Community Services Unit consist of two Deputies and one Community Service Officer. The Community Services Unit plays a key role in the ongoing safety and wellbeing of our citizens by being involved in the community. The Community Service unit is responsible for coordinating neighborhood watch programs, Ride Along Program, the Crime Free Multi Housing Program currently being re vamped), Crime Free Through Environmental Design (CPTED), Terrorism Liaison, Volunteer and Explorer programs, Community Programs and events (Cops and Clergy, Active Shooter Training, Coffee with a cop, Zone Meetings etc.), New Hire orientation, Operation Holiday Cheer, National Night Out. The Community Services unit serves as a liaison between the community and the City of Moreno Valley (City Council Meetings, Alarm citations, ABC, Planning, Parking Citations).
